# MUSC ENTERPRISE



- MUSC celebrated a topping out ceremony for the new College of Pharmacy Building on January 20, 2022. Anticipated completion with students in classes in the new facility is this fall.
- MUSC closed on a definitive partnership agreement with Greenwood Genetics Center on May
   1, 2022. The purpose is to expand their longtime collaboration to improve access to high-quality,
   coordinated and cost-effective genetic services and their recent affiliation to drive innovation in the
   genetics field.
- The Fort Johnson Property was sold to the South Carolina Battlefield Preservation Trust on September 28, 2021.
- In Our DNA SC, MUSC's population genomics program launched in partnership with company Helix, expanded to allow all MUSC patients, employees, and community members to sign up for free genetic testing to understand their genetic risk for certain cancers and cardiovascular disease. The goal is to enroll 100,000 South Carolinians over four years. As of May 2022, 35,867 invitees have been reached with 3,621 accepting. <a href="mailto:musc.edu/inourdnasc">musc.edu/inourdnasc</a>
- Through its partnership with Synaptive, MUSC was one of the first children's hospitals in the country to utilize a revolutionary surgical robotics technology called the Modus V Exoscope. Libby Infinger, M.D., MPH, Pediatric Neurosurgeon, used the technology to conduct a life-changing and very rare surgery on Giuliana Fernandez, 20 months old. - A joint MUSC-Medtronic partnership program aimed at improving care for heart failure patients
  has helped decrease readmissions as well as appointment cancellations and no-shows. The program
  enhances care coordination from inpatient to outpatient, increases access to care across South Carolina,
  and helps identify social determinants of health that may impact patient outcomes. Data from this program
  is being presented at the 2022 American Heart Association conference and 2022 American College of
  Cardiology Scientific Sessions.
- Together with Butterfly, MUSC aims to transform patient care, health education, and medical research by empowering its clinicians, students, and researchers with point-of-care access to Alpowered, handheld ultrasound. Butterfly Network, Inc. (NYSE: BFLY), is a digital health company transforming care with handheld, whole-body ultrasound, and MUSC will leverage Butterfly Blueprint,™ the company's system-wide ultrasound platform.
- The General Assembly appropriated \$10 million recurring dollars for the goal of HCC
   Comprehensive Status and \$5 million recurring dollars for statewide behavioral health programs.
- The General Assembly passed the \$5.75 million recurring dollars for tuition mitigation, preserving no increase for in-state students.
- Boeing and the Charleston County School District partnered to provide a \$2 million gift that will
  enable an expansion of mental health services in local schools for the MUSC Boeing Center for
  Children's Health.

# **MUSC ENTERPRISE**



- The Neuro Rehabilitation Institute (NRI) opened at the end of August, 2021. The NRI is multidisciplinary, encompassing OT, PT, and SLP therapies housed in the same physical location to treat a specialty population. Individuals with complex spinal cord injury, traumatic brain injury, stroke, etc. who previously had to either leave the area for comprehensive services or go to multiple clinics may now receive care here. The space is jointly operated by MUHA and the College of Health Professions (CHP) to seamlessly integrate clinical education and research into clinical practice.
- MUSC Hollings Cancer Center rolled out two mobile health units to provide critical access care
  to underserved communities across South Carolina. As part of Hollings' ongoing mission to improve
  HPV vaccination rates. The unit features state-of-the-art technology, including a 3D tomosynthesis
  mammography, that will provide access to cancer screenings to populations who otherwise may not get
  screened.
- At the invitation of President Biden, on February 2, 2022, MUSC Hollings Cancer Center Director Raymond N. DuBois, M.D., Ph.D., attended a press briefing at the White House on reigniting the Cancer Moonshot Program. The announcement will highlight plans the administration has to reduce the death rate from cancer by at least 50% over the next 25 years and to improve the experience of living with and surviving cancer for patients and their families.
- The winners of the President's 2021 Values in Action (VIA) Award are listed below by the value in which they were nominated:

Due to the tremendous, enterprise-wide contribution of her nomination, President Cole chose to elevate this nomination to President's Impact Award.
- Duke University and MUSC Department of Surgery (Mark A. Lockett, M.D., Surgical Oncologist, and Prabhakar K. Baliga, M.D.) are collaborating to share surgical quality outcomes in an effort to improve care in the Carolinas. They are using a company called Clinetic, a software startup company from Duke. Clinetic shares information seamlessly, curate's data, automates processes, and stratifies patient risk.
- MUSC hosted the inaugural LGBTQ+ Health Equity Summit on April 7 and 8, 2022. This virtual event enabled over 800 registrants to hear from the nation's leading experts in LGBTQ+ health care throughout 4 keynotes and 14 various topical sessions.
- Rick Anderson (University of Texas, Rio Grande Valley) joined MUSC as Executive Vice President of Finance and Operations November 1, 2022.

# **ACADEMICS: EDUCATION**



- MUSC College of Medicine (COM) received the final report LCME Reaccreditation visit report noting
  to, "continue full accreditation of the medical education program for an eight-year term", which took
  place in May 2021. Our next full survey visit will take place during the 2028-2029 academic year.
- The U.S. News and World Report peer school rankings released September, 2021:
  - MUSC College of Nursing (CON) tied for 23rd with the University of Arizona.
  - MUSC College of Nursing (CON) RN-BSN program is ranked 3rd in the country, moving from 10th in 2021.
- The U.S. News and World Report graduate school rankings released March, 2022:
  - MUSC #56 (of 124) for "Best Medical Schools: Research". This is the highest overall ranking to date in this category for MUSC.
  - MUSC #30 among public schools in the same category.
  - MUSC #6 for "Most Graduates Practicing in Medically Underserved Areas".
  - MUSC #65 in "Most Diverse Medical Schools".
  - MUSC #76 for "Medical Schools: Primary Care".
- The College of Pharmacy's Class of 2022 1st year Post-graduate residency match rate was 82%, above the national average of 77%.
- The PharmD/Master of Science in Health Informatics dual degree program is officially enrolling its
  first students. This dual degree is a collaboration between the College of Pharmacy and College of Health
  Professions.
- The MUSC Libraries was awarded a five-year, \$6.2M cooperative agreement from the National Library of Medicine, NIH, to serve as one of seven regional medical libraries in the United States.
   On May 1, 2021, the MUSC Libraries assumed leadership for Region 2, Network of the National Library of Medicine serving Alabama, Florida, Georgia, Mississippi, South Carolina, Tennessee, Puerto Rico, and U.S. Virgin Islands.
- MUSC College of Dental Medicine (CDM) and Roper St. Francis opened the Ryan White Clinic November 1, 2021. This is a joint partnership between the CDM and Roper St. Francis. The program will provide a unique interprofessional experience for our students who will provide oral healthcare, off-the-peninsula, to an underserved population.
- The CDM, Department of Stomatology, has made advancements on its commitment to addressing the state's dental workforce needs unique to safety net and rural communities to include a new General Practice Residency (GPR) Partnership which is an agreement with Affinity Health, a Federally Qualified Health Center in York County, to establish a training program in safety net dentistry, as well as a new Safety Net Dentistry Fellowship Program in which CDM recently received \$1.2 million from the Blue Cross Blue Shield Foundation of South Carolina to establish this new program.

### **ACADEMICS: EDUCATION**



- The Education, Innovation, and Student Life (EISL) Finance & Administration team was recognized by Academic Health Plans and BlueCross BlueShield of South Carolina for being a role model to other institutions (in-state and out-of-state) in the way MUSC processes student enrollment/waivers and administers the student health insurance plan.
- MUSC COM Department of Public Health Sciences MPH Program has received accreditation for a five-year term. Notification was received from the Council on Education for Public Health (CEPH).
- MUSC COM has named its inaugural class (18 students) of Aequitas Health Fellows. MUSC is one of the founding chapters of this new national health equity honor society, which is focused on identifying, recognizing, and developing future physician leaders to address health inequities.
- Mary McGraw Smith, M.Ed, Instructional Designer & Training Specialist, Melissa Hortman, EdD,
  Director of Instructional Technology, and Leslie Morris, M.Ed, Curriculum Coordinator, were selected
  as 2021-2022 Microsoft Innovative Educators. There are 707 across the nation, 7 across South Carolina,
  and 3 are here at MUSC. The Microsoft Innovative Educator recognizes global educator visionaries who are
  using technology to pave the way for better learning and student outcomes.

# **ACADEMICS: RESEARCH**



- NIH awards MUSC \$5.6 million for the Center of Biomedical Research Excellence (COBRE) in Oxidants, Redox Balance, and Stress Signaling project. The COBRE project will be led by Kenneth Tew, Ph.D., D.Sc., professor, and chair of the Department of Pharmacology in the College of Medicine. This Phase III award outlines a paradigm for advancing translational research in redox biology and pathobiology, with a focus on redox mechanisms underlying a variety of chronic conditions (cancer, aging, cardiovascular, diabetes, inflammation, neurodegeneration, and drug addiction) affecting South Carolina's patient population.
- MUSC now supports 128 pre-/postdoctoral fellows via training and research education grants from the NIH (the top quartile of domestic educational institutions in the number of NIH grants for research training and education). The Training in Craniofacial and Oral Health Research (T-COHR) T32 program, led by Hai Yao, Ph.D., and Michael Kern, Ph.D., in the College of Dental Medicine was renewed for an additional five years. MUSC also received funding from the National Institute of Diabetes and Digestive and Kidney Diseases to support a new Digestive Disease T32 Training Program, directed by Stephen Duncan, Ph.D., in the Department of Regenerative Medicine and Cell Biology.
- MUSC Hollings Cancer Center (HCC) was recently awarded a \$9.7 million program project grant by the National Cancer Institute (NCI) to study cancer cachexia, which affects approximately 50% of all cancer patients. Denis Guttridge, Ph.D. and Michael Ostrowski, Ph.D., are Co-Pls, in collaboration with Indiana University. Over the five-year grant period, the team aims to uncover the biology behind cachexia, a syndrome of cancer characterized by involuntary and excessive weight loss caused by the depletion of skeletal muscle and adipose tissue. This is the first time that the NCI has awarded a program project grant to study cancer cachexia.
- The Duke Endowment awarded \$4,595,458 to MUSC investigators during this ½ year cycle. This funding will:
  - o **Increase access to behavioral health resources** by integrating a behavioral health team into the Medical University of South Carolina's Sickle Cell Disease clinics.
  - o **Improve access to mental health and substance abuse treatment** by using telemedicine and remote patient monitoring for peripartum women.
  - o **Develop and test a telehealth-enabled home visitation program** providing all newborns and their families with ongoing care and social supports after delivery.
  - o **Improve access to care by increasing the number of minority providers** who provide telehealth services for low-income and rural populations at the new Lake City/Williamsburg Hospital.
  - o MUSC's Foundation for Research Development (FRD) and Kriya Therapeutics signed an exclusive license to develop next generation complement-targeted gene therapies for the treatment of geographic atrophy, glaucoma, and other ocular diseases. Bärbel Rohrer, Ph.D., Professor of Ophthalmology, led research efforts and the agreement advances those toward clinical application.

# **ACADEMICS: RESEARCH**



- Researchers from MUSC HCC are part of a \$10 million five-year global study funded by the NCI that
  will examine how regulatory policies affect smoking, vaping and the use of other nicotine products.
- MUSC HCC received a \$1.2 million from The Duke Endowment to launch a Center for Cancer
  Equity and Engagement (CCEE) to improve cancer outcomes for underserved South Carolinians
  by increasing the rates of early cancer detection through screening, expanding access to culturally
  appropriate care for screen-detected cancers, and performing research to understand better how best to
  deliver care to these communities.
- MUSC HCC is one of three NCI-designated cancer centers to be part of the Southeastern
   Consortium for Lung Cancer Health Equity. This group was created through a recent Stand Up to Cancer grant to reduce the burden of lung cancer in black communities across Virginia and the Carolinas.
- MUSC clinical research expansion is underway with the study to obtain blood specimens from
  cancer and healthy subjects to develop and refine assays for cancer in the blood titled, "Detecting
  Cancers Earlier Through Elective Plasma-based CancerSEEK Testing Ascertaining Serial Cancer Patients
  to Enable New Diagnostic II (DETECT-ASCEND 2)". The study is being conducted at the Florence site of
  our RHN, and being led by Gerard A. Silvestri, M.D., MS. The community response has been positive, and
  enrollment is open.
- A \$3.18 million grant from the National Institute of Dental and Craniofacial Research at the National
  Institutes of Health (NIH) will support a new biomedical research project conducted in partnership by

- The MUSC HCC received its first Stand Up To Cancer (SU2C) grant (\$3 million) that will make it part of the Southeastern Consortium for Lung Cancer Health Equity (SC3). This group will focus on why lung cancer continues to be one of the leading causes of death among racially and ethnically diverse populations in the nation. Other members include Massey Cancer Center at Virginia Commonwealth University and Lineberger Comprehensive Cancer Center at the University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill. <a href="https://standuptocancer.org/">https://standuptocancer.org/</a>
- The Blue Sky Award program, which aims to fund high-risk, high-rewards pilot projects among MUSC faculty members, funded two projects its inaugural year. To receive funding, there must be at least two primary investigators from two MUSC colleges. The first was by Donna Roberts, M.D., and Jill Harvey, Ph.D. titled, "A Feasibility Study of the Incorporation of a Portable MRI in a Telemedicine-Equipped Ambulance for Field Triage of Stroke Patients." And the second by Baerbel Rohrer, Ph.D., and Andrew Jakymiw, Ph.D. titled, "Delivery of mtDNA via Nanoparticles for Restoration of Tissue Homeostasis in Age-Related Macular Degeneration."
- MUSC received two TEC awards from The Association of American Medical Colleges (AAMC) This award program focuses on applicants who positively impact telehealth and health technology barriers across clinical delivery and medical training, particularly for underserved and vulnerable populations.



#### **ENTERPRISE**

- MUSC formed the new MUSC Health Midlands Division on August 1, 2021. MUSC Health Columbia Medical Center, MUSC Health Columbia Medical Center Northeast, MUSC Health Kershaw Medical Center, and MUSC Health Fairfield Emergency and Imaging were created through the purchase of four hospitals from LifePoint.
- The MUSC Health Transplant Program national rankings for 2021 showcases MUSC Health as one of the highest volume programs in the country. Most notably, MUSC Health is the 10th largest solid organ transplant program inclusive of heart, lung, liver kidney, and pancreas transplants. By organ type, MUSC Health is the fourth largest kidney transplant program in the U.S. and, for the first time ever in the history of the program, we are the highest volume center in the country for deceased-donor kidney transplants. MUSC Health added the 2nd most kidney waitlist addition in the nation. MUSC is also the 5th highest volume pancreas transplant program and the 13th highest volume heart transplant program in the US.
- MUSC Health signed a clinical affiliation agreement with AnMed in FY22. MUSC Health will serve as a resource for AnMed Health as they further develop clinical, research, and educational programs. In the areas of Pediatrics, Behavioral Health, Heart and Vascular, academic affiliations (GME).
- MUSC Health Launched vaccines for 5–11-year-olds immediately after Pfizer-BioNTech C-19 vaccine approved under FDA's emergency use authorization with 340 vaccinations administered and 2,038 scheduled within the initial 48 hours.
- Tribe513 went live on November 1, 2021 with a physician services agreement between MUSC Affiliate Physicians and Tribe513, PA for ambulatory clinics in the upstate.
- MUSC Health was a 2022 American Hospital Association Foster McGaw award finalist for community health and well-being. This award was received for community outreach work across the state of South Carolina.
- MUSC Health received the 2022 South Carolina Hospital Association Capstone award for delivering high reliability, developing a healthy workforce, and building healthy communities.
- MUSC Health established a \$340 billion contract pharmacy agreement with Palmetto Infusion which is the first of this type of arrangement and will improve access for our patients as well as financially benefit both parties.
- MUSC Health implemented three vehicles to provide access to primary care, vaccinations, and COVID-19 testing throughout South Carolina.
- MUSC Health received the Zero Harm award for suicide prevention from SCHA and had a significant decrease in CMS rate for seclusion and restraint from 1.54 FY20, 0.61 FY21, to 0.38 YTD.



- MUSC Health signed a cancer program research agreement with Lexington Medical on May 1, 2022.
- MUSC Health executed an affiliation agreement and Consulting Amendment on May 27, 2022 with a subsequent Gift Agreement on June 29, 2022 with Shriners.
- MUSC Health, MUSC Children's Health, and the MUSC Storm Eye Institute, in collaboration with
  the nonprofit organization Vision to Learn, launched a new program that will benefit thousands of
  students in the Charleston County School District (CCSD) who struggle with their vision. Through
  this collaboration, established in October 2021, CCSD students attending Title I schools will be provided
